The Book of Hours known to have belonged to Richard III has now been digitised and is on-line so that anyone can look at in full and not just the page with the well-known picture of the Annunciation. Also, part of the digitisation, is a copy of the book by the Society's Anne Sutton and Livia Visser-Fuchs which gives a detailed commentary about the Book, its origin and its

contents.

The work was done under the auspices of Leicester Cathedral, where Richard's book was used during the service of Reinterment in March 2015. We are most grateful to the Cathedral for doing the work and to Lambeth Palace Library, where the Book is usually kept, for allowing it.

Our thanks also go to Anne and Livia for their permission to add their work to complete the presentation.




That is, until Daddy Fox finds the ghost of a king, buried underneath a car park. A king who wishes only to be free.

"Release me," says the Ghost King, "and I can do anything. Just tell me your greatest wish."


For these football-loving foxes, might everything be about to change...?


